### **About the Lifesaving Society**

As Canada's lifeguarding experts, the Lifesaving Society sets the standard for lifeguard training and certifies Canada's National Lifeguards.

### **Making Canadians Water Smart**

The Lifesaving Society focuses Water Smart® drowning prevention efforts on people most at risk — like men fishing in small boats — or on those who can make a significant difference, such as parents of young children. The Society delivers Water Smart® messages through its swim program, through the media and community action. The Society's Swim to Survive® Program provides the essential minimum skills required to survive an unexpected fall into deep water.

### **Drowning Research**

The Lifesaving Society conducts research into fatal and non-fatal drowning, aquatic injury and rescue interventions. Ongoing research and analysis supports the Society's evidence—based water rescue training and Water Smart® drowning prevention education.

### Setting the Standard

The Lifesaving Society establishes aquatic safety standards and consults on aquatic safety issues for the aquatic industry, government and the judiciary. The Society offers a suite of services to help aquatic facility operators maintain and improve safe pool and waterfront operations. The Society performs aquatic safety audits and serves as experts in legal cases involving aquatic safety.

### Introduction

Lifesaving Society has a health and safety mandate for drowning and injury prevention. To meet that mandate the Society develops, accredits, and implements professional and industry standards, programs, services, and products to meet the community and public safety needs.

Aquatic Safety Inspections are utilized to assess risk within an aquatic facility and identify areas to the owner or owner's agent that are in compliance with legislation, regulations, standards, and guidelines. Through the Aquatic Safety Inspection the Lifesaving Society certified Aquatic Safety Inspector will identify operational areas which may be improved.

The Aquatic Safety Inspection is to be completed by a current certified Lifesaving Aquatic Safety Inspector who has an understanding of the regulations, protocols, and guidelines that apply to the operation of an aquatic facility.

Lifesaving Society Aquatic Safety Inspections are designed to provide a standardized method of assessing safety within an aquatic facility. The inspection can be conducted at any time and does not require the building to be in operation.

### **Mandatory Update**

Safety Inspection Report - Supervised Public Pool, a
new Aquatic Safety Inspection Process, inspection

Affiliate Delivery Partners and Aquatic Safety Inspectors will use this guide to complete the Aquatic Safety Inspector Program - 2017 Mandatory Update.

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## Section 1: Aquatic Safety Inspection Program 2017 Mandatory Update

Section 1 outlines the process, time frame, and roles and responsibilities for completing the Lifesaving Society Aquatic Safety Inspector Program - 2017 Mandatory Update (Mandatory Update).

The Mandatory Update includes a new process for Aquatic Safety Inspections which includes specific roles and responsibilities for inspectors and affiliates, updated Aquatic Safety Inspection Reports, inspection notes for clarification, and updated policies and procedures for Aquatic Safety Inspector. A Lifesaving Society Distance Recertification Form has been included in the guide.

### **Completing the Mandatory Update**

The updates to the Aquatic Safety Inspector Program are straight forward. Aquatic Safety Inspectors complete the Mandatory Update by reviewing the information provided in this guide, completing the Aquatic Safety Inspector Program Mandatory Update Individual Agreement and submitting it to the Lifesaving Society. Affiliates must be aware of the changes to the Aquatic Safety Inspector Program so they understand the process for conducting Aquatic Safety Inspections.

**NOTE:** Aquatic Safety Inspectors who have completed their original course after December 1, 2016 are not required to complete the Mandatory Update.

- Use current certified Aquatic Safety Inspectors who have completed the mandatory update to conduct Aquatic Safety Inspections after June 8, 2017
- Order required Aquatic Safety Inspection Report prior to each scheduled Aquatic Safety Inspection
- Understand the roles and responsibilities of affiliates and Aquatic Safety Inspectors

### **Aquatic Safety Inspectors**

- Complete the Mandatory Update and hold a current Aquatic Safety Inspector prior to conducting Aquatic Safety Inspections after June 8, 2017
- Use updated Aquatic Safety Inspection Reports when conducting Aquatic Safety Inspections
- Adhere to the Lifesaving Society Code of Conduct for Inspectors and Auditors

### **Section 2: Planning for Implementation**

Section 2 outlines the updated process for planning and conducting an Aquatic Safety Inspection.

Affiliates and Aquatic Safety Inspectors planning and conducting Aquatic Safety Inspections in their community are required to understand and follow the new Aquatic Safety Inspection Process.

Rationale for Change		

The Aquatic Safety Inspection Process has been formalized with specific responsibilities to improve quality assurance of Aquatic Safety Inspections. The revised process better directly supports affiliates in maintaining facilities which adhere to current: legislation, regulations, standards and guidelines, and provide a safe environment for patrons and staff.

### **Aquatic Safety Inspection Process**

### Affiliate Responsibilities

- 1. Identify a current certified Aquatic Safety Inspector to complete the Aquatic Safety Inspection
- 2. Establish date for the Aquatic Safety Inspection with the inspector
- 3. Register the Aquatic Safety Inspection with the Lifesaving Society and order the Aquatic Safety Inspection Report from the Lifesaving Society
- 4. Assign a facility liaison for the Aquatic Safety Inspector to access for the duration of the inspection
- 5. Meet with the aquatic safety inspector following completion of the inspection report
- 6. Submit the Aquatic Safety Inspection Report Summary Results to the Lifesaving Society and keep a copy of the report on file (the final page of the inspection package)

### Aquatic Safety Inspector Responsibilities

- 1. Work with the facility liaison to establish the dates of the Aquatic Safety Inspection
- 2. Confirm that the Facility has ordered the Aquatic Safety Inspection Report
- 3. Meet with the facility liaison and receive a tour of the facility
- 4. Conduct the inspection (the facility liaison will accompany the inspector and provide access to specific areas such as the mechanical and chemical storage rooms)
- 5. Meet with the owner / owner's agent to share the results of the inspection and provide them with the original completed copy of the inspection report

### **Accessing Aquatic Safety Inspection Reports**

The process for accessing Aquatic Safety Inspection Reports has been updated.

Rationale for Change		

The Lifesaving Society is aligning safety services including Aquatic Safety Inspections. For quality assurance it is important that affiliates provide Aquatic Safety Inspectors with the most current copy of the appropriate Aquatic Safety Inspection Report. By having affiliates order an Aquatic Safety Inspection Report prior to each inspection the Society is able to always provide the most up to date version.

### **Submitting Aquatic Safety Inspection Reports**

There is a new added requirement for reporting as part of the Aquatic Safety Inspection Process.

Section 3 summarizes the content in the updated Aquatic Safety Inspection Report - Supervised Public Pool. The updated Aquatic Safety Inspection Report - Supervised Public Pool is reflective of all current legislation, regulations, standards and guidelines.

### **Aquatic Safety Inspection Summary and Score**

		The total passes for each checklist is divided by the total of the passes and fails for the same checklist to give a percentage score.
		A Total Aquatic Safety Inspection Score is calculated adding all passes and dividing by the total passes and fails.
		When calculating passes and fails priority concerns are given a value of five (5) and all other items a value of one (1). Items listed as not applicable are not included in the scoring.

### **Rationale for Change**

Inclusion of a Aquatic Safety Inspection Summary and Score provides facility management with a quick at-a-glance breakdown of the relative compliance with legislation, regulations, standards and guidelines within the facility. Past/future data can be used to evaluate the implementation of maintenance, training, policies and procedures on continued or improved adherence to legislation, regulations, standards and guidelines.

### **Section 4: Inspection Notes for Clarification**

Section 4 includes important inspection notes for Aquatic Safety Inspectors. When Aquatic Safety Inspections are being completed it is important that all Aquatic Safety Inspectors are objectively evaluating inspection items to the same pass/fail criteria. Inspection notes on how to inspect the following items provide information for consistency and clarification of inspections.

### **Inspection Notes**

Topic	Item	Issue
All Inspection Topics	All Inspection Items	Some Aquatic Safety Inspectors are attempting to complete detailed analysis of inspections items.

### **Inspection Note**

Designation of pass/fail/not applicable is based on the observations of the Aquatic Safety Inspector at the time the inspection is completed.

Aquatic Safety Inspectors should look for items being present or not. Evaluation criteria requiring analysis is limited to Aquatic Safety Audits. Aquatic Safety Inspectors should recommend an Aquatic Safety Audit if they feel a more detailed review and analysis of inspection items is required.

Egress and Fire	Exit signs present above all egress doors and lit	Building code requirements for exit signage have been updated.  Additional direction is needed for consistent evaluation.

### **Inspection Note**

Egress signage must be present at all exit points along evacuation routes only. Either style of exit signage is acceptable.

### **Inspection Note**

Testing GFCI on the Receptacle

- Press the test button between the two sockets on the receptacle. Inspectors should hear a "click" and the power should be immediately shut off and anything plugged into the outlet will not work
- Reset the circuit by pushing the reset button, present between the two receptacle sockets
- Make sure the GFCI is reset after every test

Testing GFCI on the Breaker

- Visualt verify that GFCIs are installed on breakers
- Inspectors do not need to test GFCIs located on breakers. Ask the facility liaison what the facility's policy is on checking GFCIs.

### **Inspection Note**

Pool area includes (if present):

- All pool basins
- Spectator viewing gallery
- Amenities such as sauna, steam room or sun deck/patio

Aquatic Safety Inspectors will look for the following criteria:

• All doors/gates that provide direct access to the pool area lock.

A spectator viewing gallery should be physically separated from the pool deck by a barrier. The barrier does not have to include a gate and if a gate is present it does not require the ability to be locked.

### **Inspection Note**

Aquatic Safety Inspectors will look for the following criteria:

- A barrier is in place to prevent direct access to heating element or steam vent
- Meal barriers are not recommended

### **Inspection Note**

Aquatic Safety Inspectors will look for the following criteria:

- Physical barrier present to restrict access
- Signage to indicate when the amenity is closed to the public

### **Inspection Note**

These items are visually evaluated from on deck. Aquatic Safety Inspectors are not required to and should not be entering the water to evaluate these items.

Equalizer lines may be recognized by looking in the skimmers for the following:

- Find-a-member (requires lifeguard member IDs)
- Verbal confirmation from lifeguard(s)/facility liaison.

Aquatic Safety Inspectors are not required to inspect facility HR records for proof of certifications.

### **Inspection Note**

Swim instructors may not be required by the facility to be wearing uniform while in the water teaching. Aquatic Safety Inspectors should look for instructors on deck wearing articles of clothing that designates them as instructors and uniforms are present and accessible for instructors in the water.

### **Distance Recertification Process**

Lifesaving Society awards which do not have an in-person recertification course or exam are recertified through a distance process. A single recertification form has been created for all awards with a distance process. To be recertified all required criteria for the recertifications requested must be met. Once completed the recertification form is submitted to the Lifesaving Society for review and processing.

The recertification form is available on the Lifesaving Society website www.lifesaving.org.
